


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Most teaching applications will ask you to share 10-20 images of Student Work

Prepare assignments that will give you good results

- Try to target one or more item from this list
 - Technique or Theory
 - Elements of Design
 - References historical or contemporary artists/art movements
 - Allow students to demonstrate knowledge, skill, and individuality

Usually 1 to 2 year Program

May have to pass Praxis exam

MFA

Masters of Fine Art

Degree in Studio Arts
Required for teaching College
Level Studio Arts

Usually 2-3 year Program



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BA & BFA


- A cost effective way to complete the first two years of Undergraduate School OR to knock out General Education Requirements
- Articulation Agreements may be an easier path to admission



- Volunteer for a committee
- Ask to assist with curriculum development
- Sponsor a student club
- Brush up on your Office Skills







IMAGES

- 20 images of your Personal Studio Work
- 20 images of your Student Work

WRITING

- Cover Letter/Statement of Intent
- Professional CV with ALL your Exhibition, Teaching, and related experience
- Sample syllabi and assignments?
- Philosophy of Teaching?
- Artist Statement?

OTHER

- Letters of Recommendation
- Transcripts (K-12 may require Praxis Exam Scores)
- Interview(s)
- Teaching Demo?

Personal Portfolio


- Your best personal work
- Consider which will serve you best in this application
 - o depth or breadth?

Student Portfolio

- Excellent student examples at a variety of skill levels
- It's OK if the Student Work isn't the exact age/media/skill level that you're applying to teach
 - it's more about how you structure your assignments, content, and classroom
 - Can contextualize student work in your Cover Letter



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WHAT TO SAY IN YOUR COVER LETTER

- Your Cover Letter is informative, but also a writing sample.
 - The Committee will use it to see how you think and write about Art.
- Cover Letter gets read *first*, but should be written *last*.
- Use it to Contextualize, Highlight, or Connect other parts of your application
- Discuss Service x3
 - Teaching: Service to your students
 - Research: Service to own Artistic Practice
 - Service: to your Department/School
- Always answer the question: How?











WHAT TO SAY IN YOUR TEACHING PHILOSOPHY

- Discuss your philosophy on teaching art
- but ALSO share your thoughts on educating the whole person
 - Most students in art classes are not there to become Professional Artists
- Always answer the question: How?
 - How do you engage students, or help them generate ideas
 - Our How do you help them evaluate their work?
 - How do you help them generate ideas, deal with perfectionism, or setbacks?
- Tie it back to your Student Portfolio, your personal practice, or your Cover Letter









THE INTERVIEW



The Interview will be an important part of hiring for all teaching jobs

- Entry, non-credit, and Adjunct jobs will likely be a one-on-one interview
- K-12 and Full Time jobs will likely have a Hiring Committee
 - There may be an initial Phone or Zoom interview before the in-person interview
- Each search/interview will have its own agenda and set of requirements
- BUT you can think of the interview as your chance to present and elaborate upon your application.
 - In other words, you've already done most of the work
- Interview Tips:
 - Be organized and prepared
 - o Dress professionally, but comfortably. You want to feel like yourself.



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FINAL THOUGHTS

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LOOK FOR A SIDE DOOR

Prepare a simplified PDF version of your application materials, and email them out to local schools 2 weeks before classes start.

Bonus Points if HR already has you in their system

KEEP YOUR MATERIALS CURRENT

Try to be Always Ready, but acknowledge that you're Never Ready.

The timing is never perfect.

Go for it anyway.
